# Director's | page

With the beginning of the new year I want to tell you about some new projects and services that were underway at the end of 2010 and are now nearing completion and to remind you of a few you may have missed.

Last year the library and the City of Euclid worked on a project that will result in the installation of a photovoltaic solar energy system on the roofs of the library and city hall. We are working with Ohio Cooperative Solar (OCS) an employee-owned energy cooperative. The solar system will be producing clean, renewable solar energy and will be one of the larger solar installations in the State of Ohio. At this time, OCS is in the process of applying for permits and coordinating the start of the installation.

- Our Sign On System for reserving computer time and printing has received a much-needed upgrade that will simplify the scheduling process. If you haven't already done so, you will need to register for a key card to access the system in order to use the personal computers.

- With your CLEVNET library card you can download audio books and music to your iPod®, Zune®, and most MP3 players. You can "borrow" available titles on your device for 14 days as well as place a request for titles currently on loan. The download station is located in the Readers Advisory area or you can download from home.

- The Library provides FREE wireless Internet access for your 802.11b/g compliant wireless device. Library policies regarding use of the Internet also apply to wireless access.

- Fax service is available for your convenience; Library staff will send the fax on your behalf. Cost is \$.75 per page, and cover sheets are FREE.

- As a reminder...in a time when household budgets are tight, you have many options available to you to avoid accruing overdue fines on your library material:

- Manage your account through our website [www.euclidlibrary.org](http://www.euclidlibrary.org) and link to "My Account."

- Use our 24/7 book drops for your returned material. The drive-up book drop is located on the east side of the building. The walk-up book drop is next to the front door.
- You can renew your library materials conveniently from home by calling 216.261.5300 ext.103.
- Sign up for *NetNotice* to receive email notification of items coming due and reserved items available for pickup.

## STAFF BOOKSHELF

A selection of books from the Staff at EPL...



Amy Likes... **One Day** by David Nicholls

Love is in the air! Or is it? Emma and Dexter are longtime friends, but will they ever end up together? British author David Nicholls checks in on Dex and Em every July 15, from 1988 through 2007. Come along for this romantic ride and get your heartstrings pulled along the way. (Fiction)

Amy Likes... **The Girl Who Fell From the Sky** by Heidi Durrow

Rachel is *The Girl Who Fell From the Sky*. Piece together Rachel's journey of tragedy as she confronts her identity and her grief. Told from various points of view, author Heidi Durrow weaves together a thoughtful tale that is very hard to put down. (Fiction)

Carol Likes... **Squirrel Seeks Chipmunk** by David Sedaris

It would make an odd personal ad, but as the latest book by David Sedaris, it's a small, quirky gem. You'll find Sedaris' trademark humor wrapped up in a collection of animal fables. Complementing the stories are illustrations by Ian Falconer, author of the children's Olivia series. Be prepared to laugh out loud. (817 SED)

Tom Likes... **The Day We Lost The H-Bomb** by Barbara Moran

Based on recently declassified materials, the book details one of the biggest nuclear weapons accidents. An American B-52 bomber exploded over Spain during a routine refueling on January 17, 1966. Seven crew members were killed and four hydrogen bombs were scattered across the coastline. Three were recovered quickly. The fourth eluded detection for nearly two months and was recovered only after a huge search and salvage operation. (363.12 Mor)

Eric Likes... **Irving Penn: Small Trades** by V. A. Heckert & A. Lacoste

Irving Penn (1917-2009) is best known as a Vogue fashion photographer who created a sense of drama in his pictures with a masterly use of natural lighting. This book focuses on his "small trades" series which included portraits of common workers like chimney sweeps and window washers. (779.092 PEN)

Jen likes... **Packing for Mars** by Mary Roach

Roach captures both the absurdity and awe of traveling into space in her wryly funny book. (629.45 ROA)

Maureen Likes... **Room** by Emma Donoghue

Despite its disturbing premise, *Room* is a beautifully written and uplifting novel. Narrator Jack and his mother, who was kidnapped seven years earlier when she was a 19-year-old college student, celebrate his fifth birthday. They live in a tiny, 11-foot-square cell in a converted shed in the kidnapper's yard. (Fiction)

Tom Likes... **Tales From The Road** by Neil Zurcher

The author shares many personal stories from nearly forty years as a TV reporter and host of "One Tank Trips." Zurcher describes many of the unusual people he met and the events he experienced in those years. (B ZURCHER)

Jen Likes... **The Immortal Life of Henrietta Lacks** by R. Skloot

A staff and patron favorite; documents the story of how scientists took cells from an unsuspecting descendant of freed slaves and created a human cell line that has been kept alive indefinitely, enabling discoveries in such areas as cancer research, in vitro fertilization, and gene mapping. (616.02774 SKL)

Jen Likes... **The Wonderful Future That Never Was** by Gregory Benford

These predictions of future technology appeared in "Popular Mechanics" magazine between 1903 and 1970, describing possible technological innovations that range from hilariously wrong to amazingly accurate. (609 B)

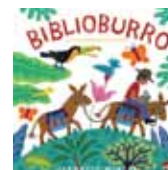


**Tuck Me In** by Dean Hacoen

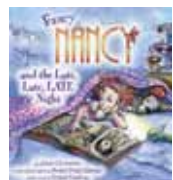
A great new book for little ones getting ready for bed. It features different baby animals getting tucked in to sleep, each with their own cozy blanket.

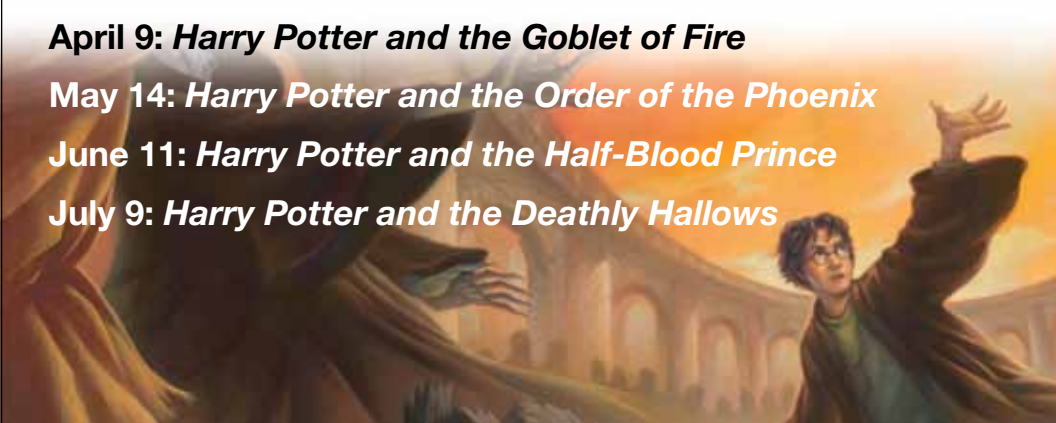

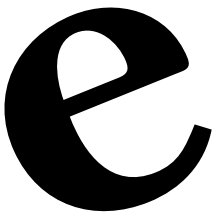
